The event was held at the British Motor Museum at Gaydon in Warwickshire with 160 delegates attending from 73 clubs, some national clubs and others like the LHCC regional clubs. There was time for networking during the lunch break and at the end of the conference and time to attend the mini supplier trade show in the concourse/gallery. 'This was the largest Expo ever' the Chairman said, 'such is all the concern from member clubs with our hobby and its future'.

Prior to the conference starting I had a meeting with Peter James insurance on their stand, they will give us a bespoke insurance plan for all members based upon research on our members cars-details, mileage, location, owner age and numbers of members interested in joining a club plan.

Topics discussed are below, and these are my raw notes taken on the day: (my comments are in italics)

1. Ideas for building members' benefits - Dave Youngs/Wayne Scott

Advertisers to sponsor club via newsletter adverts. Engage a strategic Partner such as an insurance company to get club discounts paid directly to clubs, Peter James insurance offers this. Get preferential rates from banks to save clubs money. Allow advertisers to place placards at car shows etc. and pay club fees for their attendance.

2. A new approach to archiving Andrew Austin/Andy Bye

ReCollect (FHBVC) Archiving System (demonstration) for clubs accepting up to 30,000 documents for club archives cost £670 + Vat, £300 setup fee. It allows clubs to include historical pictures, Diagrams, 3D virtual models of vehicles from manufacturers' original drawings-very clever but probably only useful to large singe marque clubs

3. Motul - Lubricants for historic vehicles Callum Goodland/Has Tahier

Engine oil analysis kit available takes 3-5 days for free analysis of your cars oil, if we join as a club to Club Motul we get 15% discount on classic oils etc for the member, and also the club gets 5% kickback + we get our Logo and a page on their website, which can help membership. They also have a portable Motul Lab that could come to the LMM on a Saturday-*I think that is a good idea*

4. Classic Car Loan project Bob Wilkinson

Young drivers have had access to over 30 cars over the last 10 years, 20 are being loaned now with this program. This brings in young drivers ages 20-40 (of which 16 drivers have actually bought their own classic when they hand back the loaner), all under a partnership agreement with the FHBVC-an interesting project for young people

5. Solving the fuels challenge Nigel Elliott

There is a UK fuel challenge-Not enough energy generation to power the government's target to be 80% of new cars and 70% of new vans sold in Great Britain to be zero emission by 2030, increasing to 100% by 2035. This means of the 32m cars on the road 16m could be electric in 6 years requiring each car to be charged 5 hours per night at cheap rate with 10kw of electric to do an average of 30 miles per day. The current National Grid has only enough energy/day to run the country, but will need and extra 30 GW of electric/day to fulfil the UK demand for electric cars. The Government plan is **unworkable**. They then showed real time graphs of the National Grid and since

March 2023 the UK is a net importer of electricity from 6 local countries via undersea cables. We are short of energy so we will still need fossil fuels to run our cars. The FBHVC believes oil and gas to be dominant in the UK till 2050. Wind & Solar always need a baseline generation as a backup from coal, oil, gas and nuclear. Nuclear normally generates 15% of our energy but many plants are offline for maintenance so the Nuclear industry only now generates 5% of our electricity. We say petrol and diesel are here to stay for our hobby, and please don't buy an electric car unless you sign a long term contract with an electric supplier-as you may regret it! It was a most interesting research presentation and has lots of data in the slides-we also discussed E10 vs E15 fuels and the FHBVC says the EU constantly rejects the greens on requiring cars to need E15 as Europe doesn't have smog problems and there is a shortage of Bio Ethanol as it is. 7. DVLA Question Time Ian Edmunds/David Whale

Lots of DVLA issues with the Dept. for Transport as all ministers are tied up with the fallout of HS2. The bigger issue is that nobody working at the DVLA has any knowledge of older cars, and most of the Marque clubs have DVLA officers who are now in their 80's and all their previous vehicle registration knowledge that the DVLA relied upon will soon be lost- we need a fix for this. It became obvious that the FHBVC is in a losing battle with the government and the DVLA over older cars as nobody in either department has any detailed interest in solving the many incorrect registration issues with 'barn finds, rare cars, an old DVLA files that are locked away and have never been scanned into their current database'- they have no resources

8. My Generation - Encouraging younger members Matt Coles

A younger members presented his thoughts about working with older cars and the valuable experience gained from friendly clubs that support generation communication on how to fix older cars. They did an instant survey of age of attendees (hands in the air) and whilst one or two were from the 1940's most of us were from the 1950's with only 2 from the 1990's
